<b>AGE TO CONSUME</b>	21
<b>CAN MINORS BE EMPLOYED?</b>	Employees under 18 yrs may not sell or serve alcohol, but may sell packaged liquor under adult supervision.
<b>AGE TO SERVE</b>	18
<b>AGE TO POUR</b>	18
<b>AGE TO SELL (PACKAGED LIQUOR)</b>	18
<b>MINORS ALLOWED ON PREMISE?</b>	In establishments where sales from food account for more than 50% of total sales, minors are allowed in the establishment but not in the designated bar area. Minors are not permitted in establishments whose food sales are less than 50%. Minors are not permitted in retail liquor stores for any reason at any time.
<b>CAN PARENTS SERVE ALCOHOL TO MINOR CHILDREN?</b>	No.
<b>HOURS OF SERVICE</b>	<b>On-Premise Establishments and Off Premise / Retail Stores</b> Monday thru Sunday: 7:00 a.m. - 12:00 a.m. (unless changed by city or county ordinance). Note: Local ordinances may prohibit sales during election hours on any Election Day.

<b>LEGAL LEVEL OF INTOXICATION WHILE DRIVING</b>	.08 BAC
<b>DRAM SHOP LAW</b>	No
<b>ID CONFISCATION</b>	Florida does not authorize licensees to confiscate false IDs. Licensees who recognize false IDs should refuse the sale and contact local law enforcement
<b>HAPPY HOUR &amp; OTHER SERVICE RESTRICTIONS</b>	Florida does not have specific laws relating to happy hours or drink specials. Licensees do not receive tax breaks on any type of promotion. Licensees may offer food and drink combinations to consumers for a special price.
<b>PENALTIES FOR SERVING OR SELLING TO A MINOR</b>	2 <sup>nd</sup> degree misdemeanor punishable by up to \$500 fine and/or up to 60 days imprisonment.
<b>WARNING SIGNS REQUIRED ON EFFECTS OF ALCOHOL ON FETUS?</b>	Eleven (11) Florida counties require that warning signs be posted where alcoholic beverages are sold. The state provides funding for signs to be voluntarily posted in other counties. As an inducement to getting the signs posted statewide, the Department of Business & Professional Regulation pledged to reduce fines for liquor law violations for those vendors who choose to post them.

**ADDENDUM: FLORIDA'S DRAM SHOP LAW**

768.125 Liability for injury or damage resulting from intoxication.

A person who sells or furnishes alcoholic beverages to a person of lawful drinking age shall not thereby become liable for injury or damage caused by or resulting from the intoxication of such person, except that a person who willfully and unlawfully sells or furnishes alcoholic beverages to a person who is not of lawful drinking age or who knowingly serves a person habitually addicted to the use of any or all alcoholic beverages may become liable for injury or damage caused by or resulting from the intoxication of such minor or person.
